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About Organisation

Aim Trust is an association of people working towards the development, empowerment and fulfillment, protection and respect of rights of men, women, transgender and children and to ensure that it reaches the marginalized sections of society including children Dalits, minority, tribal, migrants, transgender and women. Aim believes that poverty can be addressed through integrated and participatory development approaches. From its inception in the year 1999-2000, Aim works for/with marginalized, underprivileged and weaker section of the society. Aim working approaches are development oriented right based, livelihood creation, capacity building, interactive, formation of Community Groups (CGs), strengthening of Community Based Organizations (CBOs), sponsorship of children for ensuring child rights, environment protection etc. Our target groups are children, women farmers, rural youth, elderly people, tribal and communities who are excluded from socio economic development. Aim Trust is a registered humanitarian, non profit, non political, non-sectarian and non-government organization registered under the Indian Government.

Objective

- A. Ensure health services to marginalized families, creating models of sustainable livelihood options to improve the quality of lives of the marginalized.
- B. Promoting collective action among Women Self Help Groups, CBOs and Producer Organizations by building capacities and technical expertise to effectively address the issues at different level.
- C. Promoting the climate resilient practices and protecting the environmental destruction.

Vision

A society where each and every woman, man, girl, boy and Trans gender (TG) could lead life in dignity.

Mission:

To work for holistic development of marginalized, stigmatized and excluded girl, boys, women, men and TGs to address their basic needs and enhance their quality of life.

Approaches

- Promotion of People's agency and alliance of marginalized and excluded groups for access to services and entitlements.
- Introducing issues specific campaign such as anti female feticide, violence against women towards long lasting result.
- Promotion of Information and Research Centre at different levels.
- Ensuring integration of rights of children, person with disability, person living with different stigmas.
- Liaison, linking and collaborative approach with diversified groups – such as community organizations, trade unions, government functionaries, political groups (non party politics), media groups, academicians, judiciary etc.

Strategies

Based on the mission, vision statement and comparative advantages, Aim Trust is playing an important role in the promotion of developmental practices. Aim Trust has decided to focus on following areas of intervention as strategy:

- Intensive field level engagement and promotion of community models on child and women friendly local habitat, water, sanitation, food and nutrition, work & environment and livelihood issues.
- Violation reporting on access to services and entitlements.
- Capacity building and Information dissemination.
- We also engage in baseline, action research on different range of issues such as Child Rights, Food & Nutrition, and Shelter Rights for homeless, Environment, Water and Sanitation.

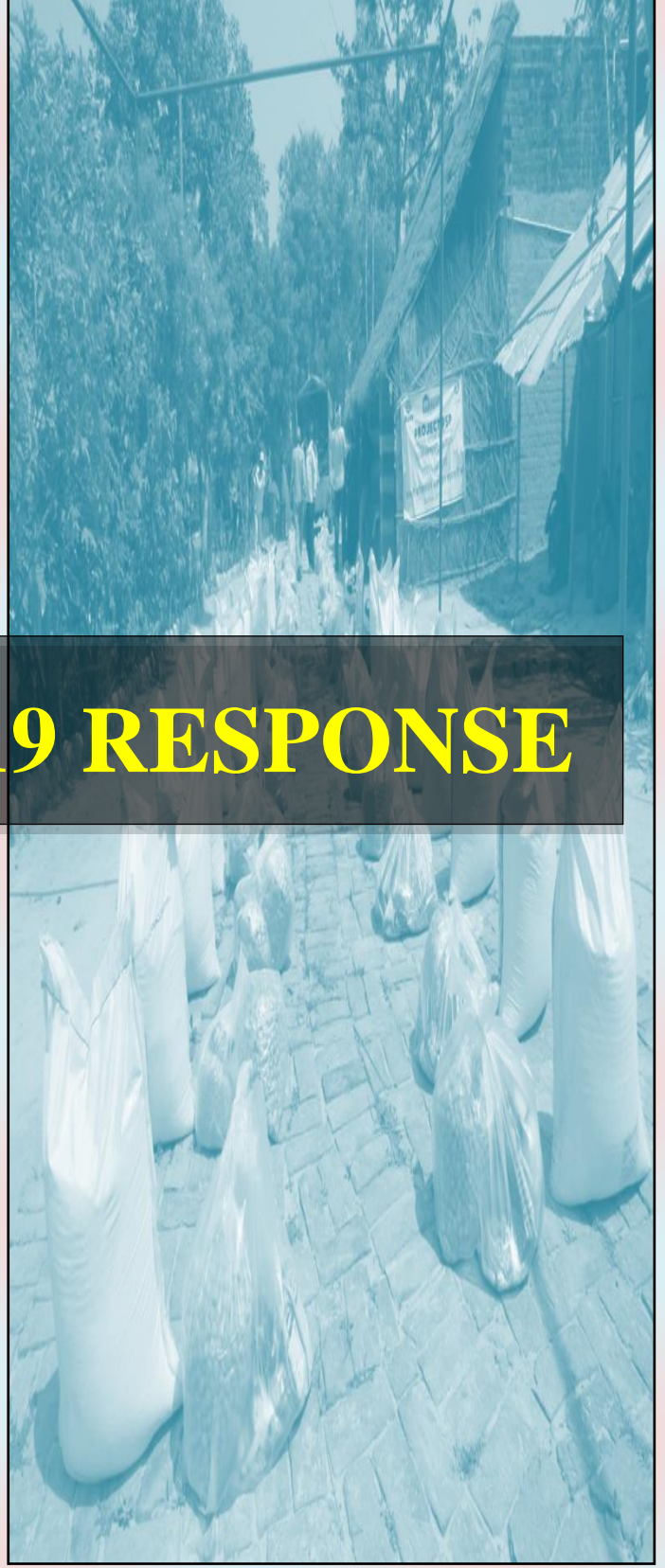

AIM COVID-19 RESPONSE



AIM Trust works actively to combat the pandemic. Since the nationwide lockdown was imposed without any preparedness the situation of the country became pathetic when people had to sleep without food. People started dying when they fell. Our citizens had no masks, health kits and also had very less knowledge regarding the virus. AIM trust worked as a warrior to get our people out of this pandemic. We distributed masks, sanitizers, hand wash, liquid soaps, sanitary pads, thermometer, PPE kit, gloves, dry rations, fruits and other eatable things in Lucknow, Varanasi, Lakhimpur kheri, Kanpur, Gorakhpur in the urban as well as rural parts in the mentioned districts of Uttar Pradesh. We distributed the said materials to the migrants, COVID patients. The organisation also worked for restoring of the livelihood by providing means of livelihood and training regarding the same to those who lost their jobs. AIM Trust focused the women and girls more as they were impacted more in this crisis. The organisation drove campaigns (online and offline) to spread awareness and reduce panic among the people and helped to provide isolation rooms in the rural areas and access to facilities of the hospitals. We reached 4500 families for the COVID response in which 3500 families were from rural and 1000 urban. Supports of the health kits and rations were also provided to frontline workers and health workers. People from urban and rural areas of our intervention area got the benefit of government schemes as they were made access to the existing schemes. Sanitization works were done with the coordination of the Panchayat officials, representative and departments. The organisation reached to the many officials and departments to provide relief to the people of our intervention area. But the current double mutant (COVID-19) has made the situation of India drastic and killing our people. The scenes of suffering in our country are hard to comprehend. As of May 4, more than 20.2 million cases of COVID-19 had been reported, with a rolling average of 378000 cases a day, together with 222000 deaths, which experts believe are likely to be substantial underestimates. Hospitals are overwhelmed, and health workers are exhausted and becoming infected. Social media is full of desperate people (doctors and the public) seeking medical oxygen, hospital beds, and other necessities. It has spread all over the rural part of our county. The cases are being reported. In this crisis AIM Trust has effectively started working to save the lives of our people with its full throttle despite lack of resources and other hurdles. The organisation provide assistance in letting the people get access to hospitals and other needs through online and online mode of working. Our volunteers work to counsel the people who are

panic. Driving campaign to spread awareness for getting vaccinated and works make aware about COVID-19 guidelines, existing schemes of government of U.P and India. AIM Trust also actively taking the data from the intervention area and preparing the case studies to provide assistance to those in need. AIM Trust is also concerned about our health workers so provided health kits to the district hospitals as well as PHCs and Sub centres in Kheri district.

Migrants returned to their native during the second phase of the corona virus and these are daily wage workers in factories, construction worker, regpickers, vendors, working in field in other states cities. Now they have lost their work and they have very few land or landless. There is no MNGREGA work due to Panchayat Election. Markets are aclosed and they dont get local construction work. They are in loss in their vegetable produces if they grow. Our health system has crashed due to lack of resources and overload of the cases. Lack of testing of the infection and vaccines hesitancy are the major problem along with lack of the vaccines availability.

AIM Trust Kheri distributed 5000 masks, 2 Sub-centers and 1 PHC and a centre hygiene kits, rations kits to 500 families having 30kg to migrants.30 children were also given food kits of 30 kg. Sanitary pads were distributed to 300 adolescents. Migrants and women were linked to several schemes 600 MGNREGA, PDS, 200 women to NRLM,25 hospitals, 200- 120 women and men to agriculture department, 30 adolescents were provided sanitary pads by CHCs and Raja Lone sing inter college. Aound 8000 people got the benefit of awareness campaign (online and offline) for protection and prevention regarding COVID. Tele counseling of the parents and children was done. Co-ordination with child protection committees and SMCs for children, 700 women farmers were supported for seeds and organic manures. 400 people were motivated for vaccination under Covid Appropriate Behaviour (CAB). 500 sweaters were distributed to children in Kheri and 400 in four slums of Lucknow. 10 People were provided jobs in development sector and working effectively for the education of children and adolescents. 400 people from 25 villages have been counseled and provided mental support during the first phase and second phase of COVID-19. Children were provided online class to restore the education of the children and adolescents after the first phase of the pandemic. 3000 migrants were supported migrated to their natives from cities. Linked to government schemes PDS, MGNREGA, Anganwadi, Agriculture, health care, Cash Transfer by Government, Widows schemes, Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Yojna, Kisaan Samman Nidhi Yojna, Ujjawala Yojna, Police administration for protection and advocates for legal aid regarding domestic violence, WCD and other Panchayat level work in coordination with Panchayat level government

officers. 10 children were got out of labour work as we drove campaign against child labour. 10 parents were stopped for not doing marriage of their daughters who were under 18. 408 adolescents were counseled regarding health and hygiene and their family conflicts. Sanitization work in 17 villages were done with the help of Gram Pradhan and BDO.

All the schools were sanitized with coordination and letter writing to the BDO and BEO.

In Lucknow the organization has distributed 250 food kits to construction workers with support CAF (Charity Aid Foundation), 2000 Masks were given to Labour department to distribute. 500 masks were distributed to migrants in lucknow. Whatsapp support group was initiated and 150 people supported. 200 sweaters were distributed to slum children.

My name is Anshika. I used to live in my village Gudiyaipur, Sitapur District (post- Miranagar). In the year 2017 my sister Preeti was pregnant so to take care of her household I came to Lucknow and started living with her in-laws. My younger brother Anmol also stays with me and my younger sisters live in the village with grandparents. Anmol studies in School. My sister's mother-in-law is a housemaid and she used to take me with her to work. My mother and father also shifted to Lucknow with me. My mother also works as a housemaid and my father is a fruit and vegetable vendor. Things were going fine and there was no shortage of food for us but then unfortunately a pandemic by the name COVID-19 started. Many people told us not to come for work where my parents worked. Although they gave us money but still it wasn't enough in the prevailing conditions. My father is also facing a lot of difficulties as police officers are not allowing him to sell fruits and vegetables in markets due to national lockdown hence he sells the items only in colonies which is not enough. Procurement of fruits and vegetables from godown is also a tedious task. He leaves from home to get vegetables from Chinhat at 12 in the night and returns at 5 in morning because police officers don't allow people to go out on main roads during the day. Apart from all that we are also not getting ration from the stores for free according to the government schemes during Corona. The people who distribute ration tell us that we don't have any proof of residence due to which we'll have to pay for the ration. Buying ration from local General stores is a heavy blow on our pockets as the stores are selling ration at high prices and there's no controlling authority as per our observation which can control the prices. I hope all this chaos to end as soon as possible as it is the only way to ease things for us and to sustain our living. In this situation Aim Trust supported us with dry ration, vegetables and biscuits for one month and also motivated us to not return to village as it will affect the education of my brother as well as mine. I am also very keen on getting education. I am a drop out. I could not study after fourth standard. Now I am very keen on getting admission in Government Primary School in fifth standard with support of Aim Trust.

Pre-Corona:

Mrs. Shanti's husband worked in Sitapur district as a labourer in a shoe showroom. Mrs. Shanti Devi worked at a sugarcane crusher as a labourer on daily wages but the earning was not enough to cater all the needs of the family. Her 2 sons and 2 daughters live in the village with her mother. Her 2 sons and a daughter are student but they also helped in doing farming in 5 bigha land they have.

During Corona:

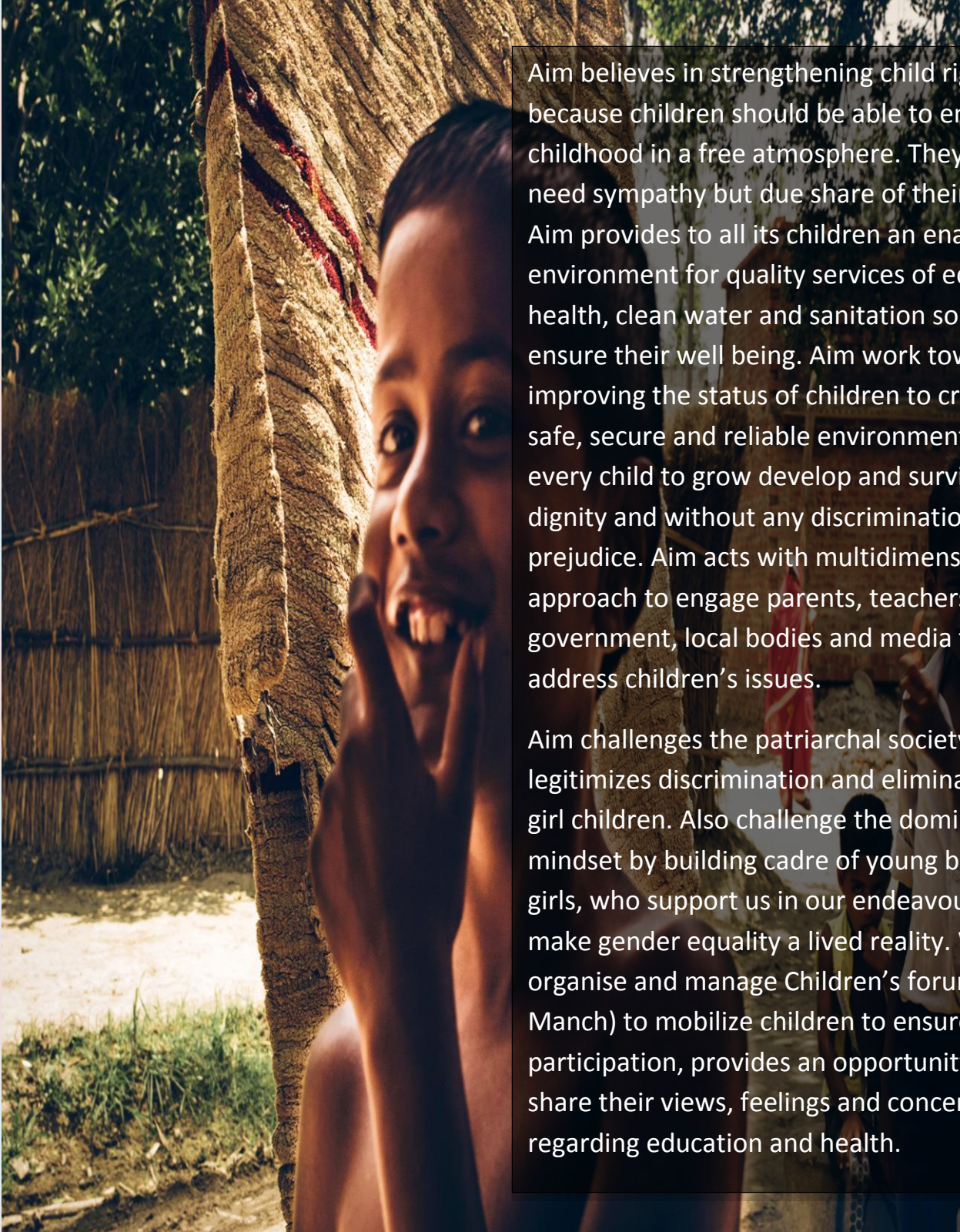
The Covid-19 outbreak has thrown most countries, including ours, into an unprecedented and massive health and humanitarian crisis. Due to which an unplanned lockdown was imposed in India and returnee migrant workers, slum dwellers, construction workers lost their jobs and started migrating. This crisis has jeopardized almost everyone so do her husband and she returned to her village permanently as they lost their job. Mrs. Shanti also lost her job at sugarcane crusher due to lockdown in the month of March. They had nothing to do and they started working in their field and taking care of the vegetable crop which was sown by Mrs. Shanti and her sons. But due to lockdown till May 2020 mandis were closed and if reopened they didn't get the price for the same. They had to sell their produces in very loss. In this way they started feeding it to animals and the work of doing vegetable farming got down and left the economic, emotional and psychological impact.

Our Intervention and impact

After the withdrawal of full lockdown, contentment zones were formed and later on mini lockdown also came into force. Once the lockdown was scraped Aim Trust helped with CAF India in boosting the moral of Mrs. Shanti Devi through facilitation, awareness generation, motivation and distribution of seeds, organic fertilizers, and masks after conducting surveys for returnee migrant worker in which she is one of the beneficiaries. She has been linked to NRLM for SHG, PDS and demanded work from Gram Pradhan under MGNREGA scheme. Due to which her economic condition has improved. She has been suggested to change the vegetable Mandi. She was motivated for share cropping method of farming. Mrs. Shanti and her family are also aware about precautions and government guidelines for Covid-19. This helped in mitigating the psychological impact on her family including her. She is very happy for what she has been supported which helps her in increasing her income and restoring the lost confidence for doing farming and she has received seeds (Pumpkin -20 gm, Kaddu-20 gm, Khabaha-50 gm) and organic fertilizer to start vegetable farming again. This will help her in increasing the income through sustainable farming of vegetables. She thanks CAF India for this.



Child Welfare



Aim believes in strengthening child rights because children should be able to enjoy their childhood in a free atmosphere. They do not need sympathy but due share of their rights. Aim provides to all its children an enabling environment for quality services of education, health, clean water and sanitation so as to ensure their well being. Aim work towards improving the status of children to create safe, secure and reliable environment for every child to grow develop and survive with dignity and without any discrimination and prejudice. Aim acts with multidimensional approach to engage parents, teachers, government, local bodies and media to address children's issues.

Aim challenges the patriarchal society, legitimizes discrimination and elimination of girl children. Also challenge the dominant mindset by building cadre of young boys and girls, who support us in our endeavours to make gender equality a lived reality. We organise and manage Children's forum (Bal Manch) to mobilize children to ensure participation, provides an opportunity to share their views, feelings and concern regarding education and health.

Meeting with SMC and facilitated their role and responsibilities

Objectives

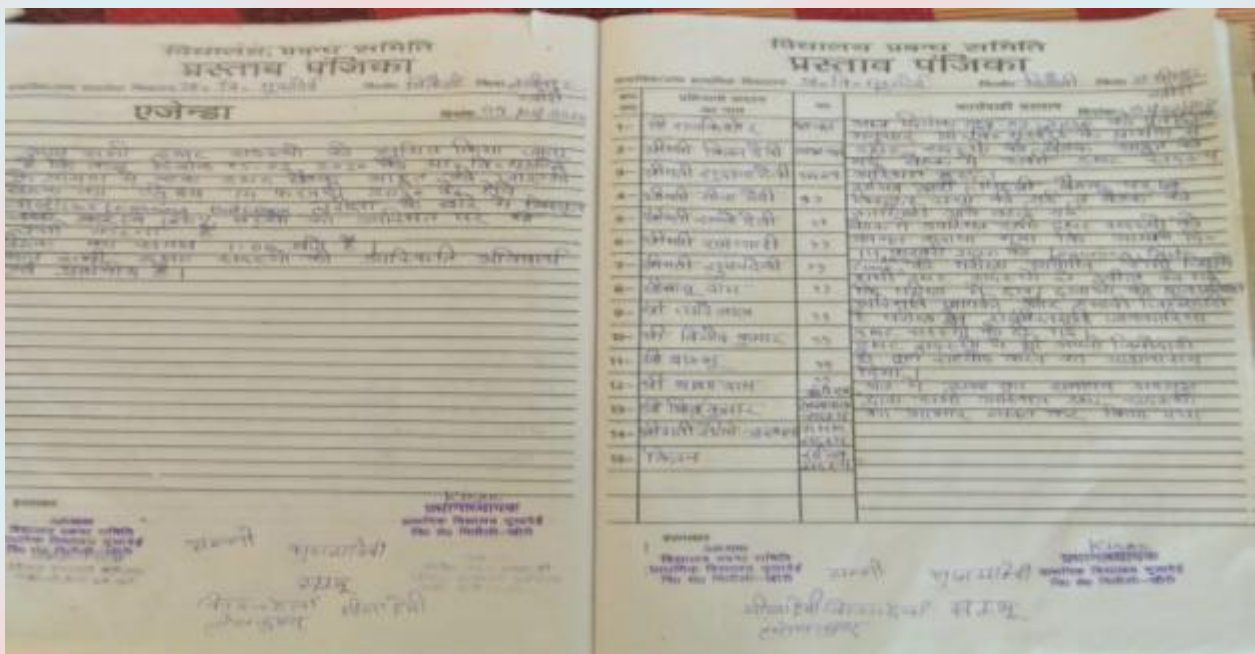
- To ensure all SMC members participation in meeting

As on dated 05.02.2020, the SMC meeting was took place at school campus of Musadei village for ensuring all participation of SMC members and awaring them on their role and responsibilities. Meeting started with the welcoming of the all SMC members. After that, Ms. Kiran, Headmistress, Primary School, Musadei shared the agenda of the meeting. The agenda were –

1. Learning outcome exam of students
2. 100% participation of student
3. Role and responsibilities of SMC

The detailed discussion were held in the meeting with the SMC and the following final decision came –

1. The learning outcome exam of student will be held on 14 Feb 2020
2. All SMC member will contact the children and ensure 100% participation in exam
3. All SMC member will participate in all meetings of SMCs



Field visit by Hon'ble Member of SCPCR Dr. Preeti Verma



We requested many time to come Lakhimpur Kheri and visit our field area, From her Busy schedule, On dated 17 May 2020, Dr. PreetiVerma , Hon. Member, UP SCPCR came to Aim Trust, Lakhimpur Kheri office and distributed masks to children and also explained to children that how to wear mask.. After that we described the current situation of the district and children. After that we gave a demand letter containing 6 points.

These points are –

1. Hand washing facilities should be constructed in all schools and hand washing materials like soap, hand wash, etc. must be ensured.
2. Free sanitary pads must be given to all the adolescent of upper primary school
3. Smartphone will be given to children's parents for online education of children
4. Arrange computer facilities in all schools and make smart classes
5. To maintain social distancing in schools, separate seating arrangements must be made for children.
6. During the lockdown and school shutdown, the grains of the midday meal of the children should be distributed in their house

Meeting with Hon'ble Cabinet Minister Shri Ashutosh Tandon (Gopal ji)

Aim Trust handed over 2000 masks (supported by CRY) to Uttar Pradesh Cabinet Minister Shri Ashutosh Tandon (Gopal ji) on May 12, 2020 and suggested the departmental order for using the masks by all vendors as their public exposure is very high hence their safety is very important for battling COVID-19. After that he directed their department to ensure mask to all street vendors and shopkeepers. He also wrote our mask donation to their Facebook pages.



A delegation of Aim Trust also met Mr. Shailendra Kumar Singh, IAS, District Magistrate of Kheri - U.P.

on May 13, 2020 and handed over 1500 masks supported by CRY - Child Rights & You. The delegation also discussed regarding protection of children and reverse migrant workers amidst COVID-19. The team advocated usage of masks

by MNREGA and other workers who have started working in groups. During the meeting a concern was also raised about proper implementation of MNREGA, PDS, ICDS, Direct Benefit Transfer and access to other welfare schemes of State and Central Government.

Candle March for justice of 13 Year girl



In protest against the rape and murdered of a 13-year-old girl in Isanagar, Lakhimpur Kheri, children from Bal Manch, Nimchani and Bhagwant Nagar took out a candle march and with the hand board made the parents aware of the violence against children and women.

Along with this, women and men of Rozi Roti sangathan also gave a demand letter to the Sub District Magistrate Mitauli with the following demands -

1. Justice should be given to victim in Isanagar
2. Compensation must be given to victim family
3. All types of violence against women and children should be eliminated
4. Law system made sensitive for women and children

Distribution of COVID 19 response materials

Objectives

- To Distribute materials to needy person and children having family
- To aware community about health and hygiene
- To Aware people about hand washing and benefits of hand washing

Sanitary Pads



For distribution of sanitary pads, first of all we prepared a list of all the adolescent girls of our field area and went to the village and verified the name of all the adolescent girls so that no teenager is left out

Soaps

In the context of Mitauli area, people do not have the habit of washing hands after defecation and before eating, as a result of which people become more ill as well as fall prey to various skin related diseases which

affect their children more.

To bring the children into hand wash practice and to make the parents aware of the benefits of hand wash, talks were made prior to soap dispensation and selected families who were financially weak and had children in their homes so that the children can be protected from disease and corona spreading due to not washing hands.



Surgical Mask and Handwaassh

PHC (Primary Health Centre), Sandilwa is situated at middle of the Kasta and Piperjhala Road and also our field. Approx. 50 villages people including Due to all these things, it is very important for all the above to be healthy as many people are directly benefited by their service, so liquid soap and mask were given to all of the above so that all of them will not only be healthy but also benefit people from their services.

Children of CACs and LCs Celebrated International Child Rights Day

Objective-

- To celebrate World Children Day

Adolesc

- To spread awareness among the children and the community regarding the celebrations and rights of children.



Children of LCs and CACs of Bhagwant Nagar, Nimcheni, Kaima, Osari and Samarsey pur of our project intervention area celebrated International Child Day on 20th November 2020 and develop design from locally available leaves and other materials. Adolescent girls also made posters for this. It was told that International Child day is observed globally on 20 November every year. The day is celebrated to promote international togetherness, awareness among children worldwide, and improving children's welfare. November 20th is an important date as it is the date in 1959 when the UN General Assembly adopted the Declaration of the Rights of the child.

Training on Pedagogy & TLM Distribution

Objective

- To give training on pedagogy to build the capacity of the supervisors, teachers.
- To enhance the learning capacity of the children through creative learning and teaching.
- To distribute the TLMs (teaching learning materials) to teachers to effecting learning and teaching at the LCs and CACs. One day training on pedagogy and distribution of TLMs (teaching learning materials) was



conducted at Ratahra Mitauli under the project 'Children Rights to Quality Education' by AIM CRY-Child Rights and You. The meeting started at 11:00 a.m. on 19th Dec 2020. Mr.



Sanjay Verma introduced the training and its purpose and handed over to Mr. Harish Kumar ji so he shared his experience with all the

participants and told about the training purpose. He conducted 3 activities regarding the challenges faced by the children. He gave case studies to the participants to solve so everyone replied in their way. He described the methods and types of pedagogy. Dr. Sanjay Kumar shared his experience of teaching and also told about the child centred and child friendly education. Mr. Sanjay Rai told about the usage of locally available resources for TLM making to enhance the participation of the children in education and make it interesting. He also told about the present challenges and continuous efforts for getting the schools opened. Mr. Sanjay Verma, research coordinator conducted an activity and told how to make the education not a burden to children but interesting. He told about the communication barriers during the class and after the class with effective solution. At last TLMs- teaching learning materials were distributed to the teachers by the resource person of their respective villages. The meeting got over at 4:00 p.m.

TRIPODs have been distributed at Child Activity Centre in Nimchaini and Bhagwant Nagar villages respectively.

Objective:

- To equip with online centre with better facility
- For effective teaching learning

Children of Child Activity Centre in Nimchaini and Bhagwant Nagar enjoy uninterrupted online classes taught by the subject experts by the Child Rights and You. Children were facing problems while learning, as cell phones/tablets were not movable or adjustable as per the situation. During the class we observed that due to communication barriers effective communication was not possible fully.



A collective meeting was organized to sensitize the parents regarding education of the children

Objective:

- To do parents meeting to give them feedback of both the children and parents
- To sensitize community for coordination
- To save children not to be engaged in dry leaves and wood collection

It was observed that few children of the village are not going to school regularly and they also started avoiding English classes. So a community meeting was organized in Kaima village to know the problems of the children. During the meeting it was seen that children were engaged in dry leaves collection due to

scorching cold. Few children found English subject tuff and didn't complete the home work. Parents of the children made aware about the importance of the study of the children. They were sensitized by citing several examples not to engage children in labour work. Aim staffs requested the parents not to send their children for such work and send their children to centre and school regularly. Action plan were made to make their home work for English subject easier so that they can complete it easily and don't find difficult. We planned for several activities to make English interesting. Children and parents were also made aware about the children health and sanitation.



Campaign to stop beggary and child labor by sensitizing the community

Objective:

- To drive a campaign to stop child beggary
- To sensitize the community for not engaging children in labour work
- To sensitize the community for children's rights

AIM Trust and Cry (Child Rights and You) works on the right to education of children In the Mitauli block of Kheri district. An awareness



campaign is being organized by AIM



Trust in Mitauli Block from 26th December 2020 regarding child begging and child labor. In this sequence, this campaign was conducted in Mitauli on 7th

of Jan, 2021 with the support of Shri Anil Kumar Saini Police Station Head and Team Mitauli and AIM. Program director Sanjay Verma told that the children are being engaged in child labor and child begging, which deprives them of their right to education. Through this campaign, the people of the community would be sensitive for children's right to education and protection. It was insured by the child line and local administration that necessary action will also be taken against the shopkeeper if they employ the children for work.

Objective:

- To drive a campaign to stop child beggary
- To sensitize the community for not engaging children in labour work
- To sensitize the community for children's rights

AIM Trust is an NGO working in collaboration with CRY (Child Rights and You) on the right to education of children in Mitauli block of Kheri. Since 26 December 2020, the organization run awareness campaigns at various places in Mitauli block to stop child begging and child labour. In the same sequence, this campaign was carried out in Kasta today on 8th Jan, 2021 with support of Shri Surendra Singh, Outpost Incharge, Kasta Mitauli, Childline team and other CBOs. Research Coordinator Sanjay Verma told that due to the closure of schools during COVID-19, children are being children are engaged at shops for labour work bricks factory and other places as well on daily wages ranging from 10 to 20 rupees, which deprived them of their right to education and other rights. This campaign will help us to make the community sensitive towards the rights of children. The campaign got over at 5:10 pm.



Meetings with adolescent girls on menstruation (13th February 2021)Objective

- To talk about the issues of adolescents
- To discuss the menstruation and hygiene
- To spread awareness in the community
- To sensitize the community for adolescents issues to eradicate social taboo



Issues of menstrual morbidities, menstrual hygiene, and cultural practices are rarely discussed by adolescents. The burden of menstruation and cultural practices which the adolescent girls have to face has been less quantified. Menstruation is still considered as a taboo across various cultures, especially rural part, and adolescent girls of the community feel that menstruation is a curse or burden. Women/girls in their menstrual period are considered as filthy, shameful, or impure. The community restricts menstruating women/girls from various activities such as

cooking, touching food, being with family members, attending religious ceremonies, and bathing shared by the adolescents of Bhagwant Nagar, Pakaria and Nimchaini villages of Kheri district in a meeting conducted by **AIM Trust and CRY- Child Rights and You** on 13th February 2021. Ms. Savitri an adolescent of Pakaria village told menstruation continues to be a subject of gender disparity and myths about menstruation are largely prevalent, forces girls to drop out of school early or be ostracised for the duration of their menstrual cycle every month. Ms. Deepa from Nimchaini village told that Most of the adolescent girls in villages use rags and old clothes during menstruation, increasing susceptibility to RTI's. Adolescents constitute one-fifths of India's population and yet their sexual health needs remain largely unaddressed Menstruation is a physiological process, and such taboos and



myths should be allayed but it's not possible without participation of the men.

***'Ghadi Kya Kahti Hai'* campaign was driven in the villages**

Objective

- To teach the children to learn how to know the time in watch
- To make the children learn about the time through fun learning and activities
- To spread the awareness about the importance of the time and what a watch says

Ghadi Kya Kahti Hai campaign is being run in our intervention area to make the children aware how to watch time through games and fun learning. In a previous meeting we found that children face difficulties to learn time. So we decided to run a campaign with the help of our team and centre facilitators. Children were very excited to learn how to watch time. They actively participated in our campaign. People of the community were also aware about the time. We have also seen that villagers who are illiterate don't know how to watch time in watch. Seeing that their children know how to watch time they were delighted. The team also told the children to be punctual in life and importance of the time.

Children especially girls can have to access to education. People of the villages are not aware about the government guidelines for opening of the schools. Children participate in a good number to sensitize the community for education in which adolescents also participated to make the campaign successful.

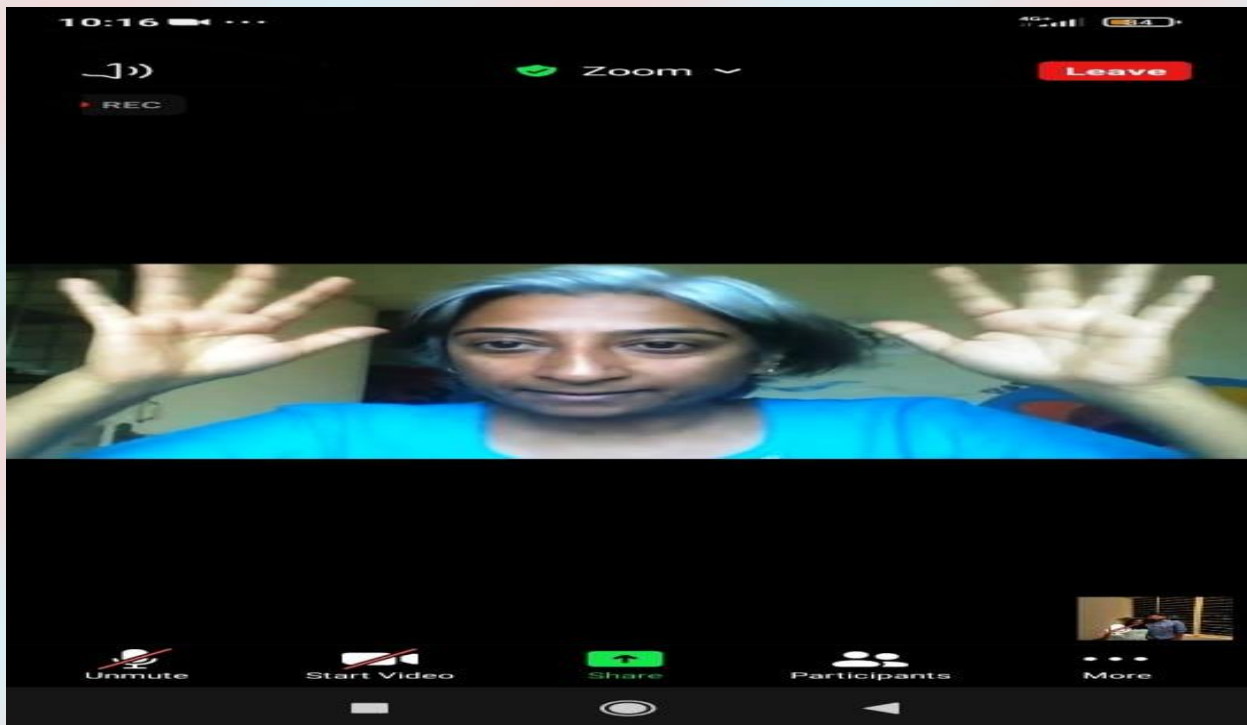

CRY- Child Rights and You with coordination of the resource agency (Play for Peace) organized a workshop on 24/03/2021 through Zoom Call. 4 children participated in the workshop from Kheri in which 2 girls and 2 boys raised their voice through activities. The objective of the session was to get children to reflect and share their views on education, aspirations in context of NEP. The participants of the workshop were children, teachers, trainers, managers and other staffs. The workshop was divided into various interactive sessions addressed/facilitated by various speakers such as teachers, adolescent students, other network partners as well as representatives.



Children eagerly wait for mobile library

Objective

- To increase the interest of the children towards education
- To have access to different types of books
- To bridge the digital divide gap in rural area
- To spread awareness among the village regarding the importance of education

Every 15th day of the month, our educators travel among the villages of our intervention area armed with small cartons filled with books carrying on scooty/bike/rickshaw. “Children in the village eagerly await me. It is heart-warming to see their enthusiasm to read,” one of our educators, Ms. Pinki says. The organisation focuses on making books accessible to children in the villages of Mitauli block amidst COVID-19 as schools are closed. Now again schools colleges have been temporally closed due to the spread of the virus. Adolescents generally are not allowed to go anywhere. Neither they have access to good books nor they are able to bear the cost of the books. This mobility library helps us to make the children in loop of education. Children can get good books latest books of poems, stories, creative ideas and NCERT. This also helps us to sensitize the community regarding education

Anshu Kumar lives in Samarseypur village, Block Mitauli, District Kheri of U.P. Anshu Kumar a differently abled child is 12 years old and in 5th standard. He can't see from his one eye. He is very laborious student and comes to our centre regularly. There are 5 members in his family. His father name is Mr. Dharmesh Kumar who is a labourer works on daily wage. He is also a potter and makes pottery during Diwali festival. His father owns only 5 Bigha of land and has kept that on mortgage. He is too poor to run his family. His mother Mrs. Pushpa Devi is home maker and also member of s self help group named Radha Prerna. His older sister (Ms. Sita) is a student of 10th class and Ms. Radha younger sister in 3rd standard. Anshu Kumar was very weak and low steamed student as others used to judge by his physical incapability (just for only one eye). He rarely went to school. Our volunteers made him understand and told about our learning corner which is being run in his village. He started coming to our centre (pre- COVID-19) when his parents agreed. He was delighted as he started learning through activities and fun. Other children of the centre supported him and played with him. It was interesting for him. Mr. Anshu told that he was very shy in nature earlier. During lockdown due to COVID -19 Ms. Rohini (centre facilitator) helped him a lot and continued his education by coming to his house for providing home work by providing education materials. He learns

through TLM that helps him to clear his doubts and don't have to mug up on. Now he is punctual and has started going to school as well. He completes his home work without any pressure. He loves reading Hindi. Earlier he was not able to read or write Hindi but now he is able to write dictation and good at reading. He told that Ms. Rohini (teacher) is very supportive and she taught her very nicely as a result he is able to solve questions of maths like Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication and Divide. He has learnt tables as well. He told that he find English difficult telling about his aspiration. But he wants to improve it. His learning capacity has improved. He told that he loves reciting poems with other children. He loves fund learning classes and often requests the teacher to conduct the activities.

Anjali Devi a 12 years old girl is a resident of Nimchaini Village of Mitauli Block, Kheri- U.P. She belongs to marginalized community. Her father name is Mr. Surendra (45 year old) and mother is Mrs. Reshma (41 years old). Anjali is in 8th standard now after being promoted in 7th class. Her family owns only 1 Bigha of land. Her father is a daily wage labourer and don't earn enough to cater even basic needs of the family. Her mother is a home maker and also work to 'Rakhi' (a product which is used to tie to celebrate Raksha Bandhan an Indian famous festival) to support her family. But this is only for few days work. Due to COVID-19 we had to suffer a lot as there was lockdown in the country. She had to stay in home; schools were closed and were not able to meet her friends and relatives. Due to several of rumours were being spread they were afraid of getting infected. Many awareness campaigns were driven to make them aware during this pandemic with the help of local administration. Her father lost his work and came back to her village and he has nothing to do. With the help of the Aim staffs her father was connected to MGNREGA scheme and he got the work once the lockdown was eased. Anjali Devi told that during lockdown Aim staffs used to call on alternative days. Ms. Deepa Raj used to go to her home and provide chart paper and books to study and also made aware about Corona Virus. Several tasks were given to Anjali to connect her from study. She used to make drawing from locally available resources. Though she used to get tasks but there was a huge loss as they were not getting they had to get for their education. She also used to share that she gets bored and home related were also given by their parents to work so she didn't get much time to her study. She was not able to enjoy with her friends. She wanted to come to Child Activity Centre. She

used to call for solving maths questions but once the lockdown was eased Aim staffs started coming to villages with proper precautions and distributed masks, sanitizers and told our parents if they want to send their children they can send to our Child Activity Centre. They also told they had taken permission to continue the centre in several shifts in 10 students in each groups with proper physical distancing. Her parent agreed to send her so a consent letter was taken from the organization. Masks and handwash was also provided to the centre to protect the children from the spread of Corona Virus. She started coming to the centre regularly in after noon batch. She was provided colour pen and chart paper and also started enjoying library made at CAC centre where she studies poems and stories along with her syllabus. After few days children were informed that there will be facility of online classes amidst pandemic. She was overwhelmed after knowing this and also was surprised that as she didn't know about it earlier. Now she enjoys online learning through Zoom apps where experts from CRY Delhi, teach through fun and animation and now they have full access to all subjects. This initiative helped her to share her problems with subject experts and have knowledge technology in this marginalized community which is the need of the hour. Now she also learns through activities like- drawing, children chain, science and maths from locally available resources, TLMs, live presentation, online presentation. Her interest has increased for her study and daily comes to the centre for 3 hours. She loves drawing and her maths and science subject have improved. Now she has started going to school as well.



Women Welfare

Prosperity through Climate Resilient Agriculture and Responsive Sugarcane Value Chain

The objectives that we planned were as per the need of the project and problems drawn from the field of Varanasi district faced by the urban poor especially by the street vendors. We worked for the awareness generation for their rights and entitlement as several laws, acts and policies by the government are being implemented but not effective. These urban poor who come from marginalized community and are slum dwellers are not aware of their rights and government schemes. They are often been neglected though there are several laws regarding vending. The main objective of the project is to enable sustainable and inclusive cities by the empowered urban poor communities through people led sustainable actions at the local, city, state and national levels. In Varanasi district several construction work is going on as per the smart city project where municipal misuses its power and disturb the vendors by removing their house. No vending zones are defined. Covid-19 has brought the major challenges in conducting the physical meeting. Mass mobilization cannot be done to drive any campaign for the demand of their rights and exploitation. AIM Trust works in 15 villages of Mitauli block of Kheri district, U.P. in which 5 villages are core villages where resource centres have been established with support of Oxfam India.

ToT of 50 women farmers on CRA practices

A One day training was organized for women farmers with an objective to trained



women farmers on different climate resilient practices and to develop the understanding of doing CRA practices by using locally available low cost. The training was held at Ratahra Block Mitauli, District Kheri. Mr. Dhru Kumar agriculture expert and Mr. Garav Gupta District manager of UPSRLM livelihood. Mr. Omprakash Gupta livelihood block mission manager of UPSRLM, Mr. Manish Singh was the resource persons of the training. Mr. Dhru Kumar told about different practices of climate

resilient like soil testing, land treatment and seed treatment, usage and benefits of s, machaan, system of rice intensification and system of wheat intensification, mixed cropping, inter cropping, kitchen garden. Mr. Omprakash Gupta told about the water efficient irrigation methods and different government schemes related to CRA practices like spring color, direct benefit transfer

Agricultural Experts Mr. Manish told the Women farmers to do cultivation through mulching method through video call that we can control weeds by cultivating with

mulching method. And there is also moisture in the field, due to which we do not need to irrigate again and again. Manish Ji informed women farmers about Panchsheel Vatika that we can increase their income by growing five types of crops in a single field, women farmers told about growing nursery of vegetables. For nursery rising, the size of the beds should be 1 meter wide and 3 meters long.

Monthly review of agriculture plan



Monthly review of the agricultural plan implementation was organized in the villages Osari, Dari and Uchitaliya in which women farmer leaders of the self help group of 10core villages participated. Total 62 women farmers participated in the review meeting who were involved in preparing the agriculture plan. Implementation plan, challenges faced by farmers /staffs and implementations strategies were discussed in the meeting. Women from 10 villages told about their self help groups and working plan for farming.

Sarojani Devi group name Shanti Mahila Kisan Group from Rampurva village told that most of the women farmers don't own lands that are why are deprived of benefits of most of the government schemes. Further she added that these women farmers don't also don't get any capacity building training from government agricultural or other departments. Sudama Devi from Bhithara village told that they would adopt share learning methods of farming so that women farmers would be able to learn new methods, techniques and model of farming. By doing this their capacity will increase as well as they will also get chances to train other women farmers. Chandrakali Devi, chairperson of Osari's Hari Narayan Women Farmer (SHG), told how the women of her group are preparing Jivamrit , Vermi-compost, organic pesticides and using it as well. Everyone present over there in the meeting told that the COVID-19 has impacted almost every farmers especially women farmers where the situation of the vulnerable farmers become vulnerable.

Training of 30 women farmers on nutritionally improved variety of crops

The month of September is being celebrated as Nutrition Month, in the same sequence, on 24-9-2020, 25 women farmers of 10 villages were trained on the nutritious crop at Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Katiya Manpur. The training was started with the welcome and introduction of all the women farmers. Dr. Anand, President and Senior Agricultural Scientist of Krishi Vigyan Kendra, trained women farmers to cultivate crops such as jowar, bajra, corn barley, sawa, etc. Anand ji told the women farmers that the demand for this grain has increased globally. By growing such crops, we will get all kinds of nutrients as well as by cultivating these crops; we have to use less fertilizer and chemical medicines. have to do Dr. Anand ji told the women farmers that due to lack of knowledge of the importance of many vegetables, fruits, and medicinal plants growing around us, we are not using them in our diet.



Dr. Anand Ji told the women farmers about zinc-rich wheat that the agricultural scientist has developed a high zinc-rich species for the nutrient supply, which we should do here, wheat variety WB 02, PBW01 BHU25 It has zinc, 42 ppm and iron 40 ppm. Its yield is 51.6 quintal / hectare and told about the cultivation of papaya.

Soil scientist Sachin Pratap Tomar of Krishi Vigyan Kendra gave training about what is the importance of soil health management in human nutrition. He said that soil testing and the management of balanced nutrients are very important. Sachin Tomar told women farmers that for soil health, crop cycle, crop residue management, deep plowing, using green manure

leads to more bacterial growth in the soil so that the fruit or grain we get is rich in nutrients. Will be

Cultivation of Kenova- Sachin Tomar trained women farmers to cultivate Kenova, that it is a Rabi crop, it is rich in protein, it requires seeds at the rate of 250 grams per acre, Eat its fruits as porridge. Sachin Tomar told women farmers about the cultivation of drumstick. Drum is a very useful plant; all parts of the plant are used in food medicine industrial work.

It gets four times calcium than milk and seven times more vitamin C than orange. Drumstick flowers use fruits and leaves as food. Sachin Tomar told women farmers about Kitchen garden.

Strengthening five women farmer support center

Women farmer resource centre strengthen in 5 villages; Osari, Nimcheni, Dari, samrsepur, Revana for sustained agricultural practices. Women farmer groups manage these centers. Pipes and Sprayer has been provided to centre. One women leader from each group selected to manage s. Women farmers hire this equipment from collective in nominal price and they returned after some time when they will have sufficient money.

A ten days Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) visit plan was organized from 16th July to 29th July, 2020



In ten core village, Block Mitauli, District Kheri. The main objective of this visit plan is to collect field level data of farmers land usage, irrigation pattern, cropping pattern etc and to prepare a plan for agriculture. Project team members and community member make a Village agricultural development plan. During the period of one year, village level agriculture has been prepared. , men and cluster resource person were participated during the process.

To provide benefits of agriculture government schemes to which I meet Amit bajpye (agriculture extant ion officer) Mitauli, and requested him to provide seeds to them thus these women received 40 kg masoor seeds and 30 kg mustard seeds 65 women farmers gets benefits The Uttar Pradesh National Livelihood



Mission has given the



government the responsibility of providing self-help to women of the self-help groups under the nutritious food scheme by packing dry rations to the Anganwadi centers, in this context, I met the block manager of UPSRLM, Om Prakash Gupta and the Mahila Kisan Group Asked the women to join this scheme, as

a result of which 6 women farmers groups got to distribute ration.

The sugar sector provides a significant boost to the rural economy. It utilizes rural resources to produce sugar for domestic and international markets. It provides a source of income to farmers, farm workers, mill workers and all those who are involved across the value chain. India is the second largest sugar producing country after Brazil and has remained a key growth driver for world sugar growing above the Asian and world consumption growth average. At the same time, production of sugar in India is associated with an array of social and environmental challenges. Sustainability in sugar value chain is a complex issue and it needs various stakeholders to come together.

Uttar Pradesh is the major sugar producing state of the country. There are total 735 sugar mills in India as on march 2018- Private mills:365, cooperative mills> 327 and public mills 43. Sugar production in India was 32 million tones in India. A 10% increase in average cane yield along with an improved national sugar recovery rate from 11% to 11.32% has contributed to record sugar production in India in the last crushing season of 2017-2018. This has led to a fall in sugar prices in the domestic market. Against the cost of production of rupees 36 per kg incurred by the mills, sugar was traded at rupees 25.50 a kg (ex-factory) and rupees 29 per kg in the wholesale market. Sugar prices have declined by 10.2 percent in April 2018 alone and 24.56 percent since the current crushing season started in October 2018.

In the intervention area it was found that there are gender based discrimination in wage distribution between men and women as women farm workers gets less remuneration for the same work. In Muzaffarnagar and Meerut large section of migrant population are working in the field of sugarcane without basic amenities. There are issues of child labour as well. Women farm workers especially migrant farmers do not get basic facilities of health and hygiene.

District level consultation of women farmers and stakeholders in Meerut

District level women farmer and stakeholder consultation was held on 28.09.2020. This consultation was held by the Moon Shin Meerut. Mr. Sanjeev, Bharat uday education society briefed the women farmer about the exploitation of women in the district level women farmers and briefed about the rights of women farmers There are many provisions to give more to the woman's work wages and men & women are informed about government schemes. It was also told that there is a need to fight for rights by rallying against exploitation.



Meeting with women farmers and stakeholders regarding sugarcane value chain

- Alternate meeting with women farmers among of our project area in Kheri, village level consultation in Muzaffarnagar and Meerut districts are being conducted where women farmers and small farmers are entertained of their rights and entitlements with the stakeholders.
- Home visits of the farmers, field visits of the women farmers, small farmers are also done by connecting 10-15 women.

said about sugarcane supply chain that sugarcane cultivation is done on a large scale in Uttar Pradesh. Due to this, the livelihood of about 5.56 corer people is so big that how the sugar mill owners are cheating the sugarcane farmers

Sugarcane is the cash crop of farmers, which the farmer sells and fulfills his needs,



but due to the attitude of the sugar mill and the government, the farmer has become frustrated. Child labor has increased at the time of lock down due to which children are being deprived of education. Dr. Sanjay said that for this we need an organization because without the fight of the organization cannot be won due to non-payment of sugarcane on time, the farmer has to work with interest, which makes his condition getting worse day by day. Anjani Dixit from Rashtriya Kisan Majdoor Sang than said that small farmers are forced to abandon sugarcane cultivation on a large scale due to non-slip of small farmers

Anjani Dixit said that the ordinance for agriculture that the government has brought will hurt the farmer more, if the government is talking about corporate farming, then there will be no farmer in it, but he will remain a laborer in his own farm.

Mr.Dhruv Ji said that women work in some form or the other, but their wages are given half as much as men. Together with all the fellows formed an action plan in which it was decided that-

- All the CSOs set up in the meeting will document their cases of harassment of sugarcane child rights, women's rights etc. in the sugarcane area in their respective areas. All CSOs Shared with local organizations and planned how will they intervene with the project to resolve them.
- All the organizations, which are from their project area or according to their provision, will discuss these in the villages' meetings to understand the issue and understand the community.
- They will discuss this issue in all their meetings, keeping an eye on the incidents of harassment in their sugarcane area and sharing it with the people, to create an atmosphere to prevent it.
- Together with like-minded people, it will further expand the prevalence of this issue.
- Under this program, which will get useful literature material to increase the knowledge and understanding of the people, they will reach the community.

From village Kasta to Sitapur road, Piparjhla is 7 km from Osri, which is 1km in North direction from main road. Agriculture is the main occupation of the people and some people works as daily wage laborer. A 45 year old women farmer Kanti Devi w/o Rajendra Prasad is a resident of this village. She has 5th standard and owns 10 bigha of agricultural land. She has six members. Kanti Devi selected for sowing of wheat under SWI method under Climate resilient Agricultural Project.

In regular meeting under CRA project members used to discuss different techniques of farming and with an objective to adopt the concept of Kanti Devi selected for sowing of wheat under swi method under Climate Adaptation Agricultural Kanti Devi was quite interested in all these concept and show her interested in demonstrating CRA process. The project team trained Kanti Devi with agricultural scientists on climate adaptation farming. Kanti Devi started his demonstration on Ravi crop and showing Wheat in 1 Acre. She implemented wheat seeds maintaining distance of 20 cm between each line and 8 cm between plant distances .During farming process, Kanti Devi maintained all the specification and techniques on seed germination, seed treatment, soil treatment and also used proper bio fertilizer that saved the crop from disease and insects and reducing investment cost too. Kanti Devi received Rs. 6000 as incentive from the department for making vermi compost. Before this demonstration under CRA project Kanti Devi wheat Production 13 quintal / Acre .Now this time wheat production 17quintal/Acre. So she motivated and also started motivating other women farmers of the communities to increase income through demonstration and new CRA agricultural technique .the chart given below represent the investment and gain in wheat farming.

From village Kasta to Sitapur road, in the east direction, there is 1 km rough route to go to the village from the main road. She is 8th passed women farmer. There are 3 members in her family only. They have a total of 2 Bigha of land. She is associated with Aim Trust since 2016, participates in the work done by trust and has received new method and new information related to



agriculture. Earlier, farmers used to cultivate paddy and vegetable in their fields but they were not aware of scientific method of farming, amount of fertilizers and chemical pests used in the field, number of the land, seeds according to area and types of soils of our region, In this way, we used to go to the shop and we used to bring the seeds that the shopkeeper gave us and sowing it, but the yield was not good. But since we got connected with the AIM organization and we got knowledge of all these, after this year we cultivated tomato and cabbage in 1 Bigha. The sowing of cabbage in the middle of the two lines is as a symposium. Project workers come in between and see our farm and keep reporting about what to do next. In this farming, we treated the land with Trichoderma and sowing the seeds and after this, using organic fossil, discomposure, and organic insecticides, which reduced our farming cost. This time the cultivation of sponge gourd is done by Mulching method in 1 Bigha, Thereby, weeds in the mirror were very low and the moisture remained. Which we did not even have to irrigate again and the fertilizer that we give in the field, due to low weeds, that fertilizer meets our plants. It reduced their yield and decreased cost. This time, the total cost of Tomato + Cauliflower is 12000 rupees and sponge gourd 340000 rupees sold worth 46000 thousand rupees. Our income increased in this way and all its credit goes to Aim Trust and project workers who came to our village and formed a Women's Farmer Group and gave new information related to agriculture.

Urban Poor Welfare

The objectives that we planned were as per the need of the project and problems drawn from the field of Varanasi district faced by the urban poor especially by the street vendors. We worked for the awareness generation for their rights and entitlement as several laws, acts and policies by the government are being implemented but not effective. These urban poor who come from marginalized community and are slum dwellers are not aware of their rights and government schemes. They are often been neglected though there are several laws regarding vending. The main objective of the project is to enable sustainable and inclusive cities by the empowered urban poor communities through people led sustainable actions at the local, city, state and national levels. In Varanasi district several construction work is going on as per the smart city project where municipal misuses its power and disturb the vendors by removing their house. No vending zones are defined. Covid-19 has brought the major challenges in conducting the physical meeting. Mass mobilization cannot be done to drive any campaign for the demand of their rights and exploitation.



Highlights of our work

- Selection of new location to include street vendors under the Sustainable Cities 3.0 project, analysis of the current status of street vendors in Varanasi and contact with the street vendor community for awareness on the rights of street vendors
- Awareness on Covid -19 to community and street vendors
- Relief work - Mask and ration distribution
- Shri Neeraj Kumar Srivastava (working in Hindustan Liver Private Limited and SamajSevi) supported 1750 masks, which were distributed to migrant laborers and all slums in the field, on demand by AIM Trust and Asangathit Kamgar Adhikar Manch (AKAM) Varanasi.
- On the demand of the organization, social workers Vijay Kumar and Vishal Anandji supported 50 packets of dry ration which
- was distributed to the migrant laborers and people living in slums.
- Sanitizer was demanded from Sir Sunderlal Hospital and sprayed sanitizer and bleaching powder to prevent corona infection in the slum
- Awareness on Covid 19 to community and street vendors.
- On August 18, 2020, municipal employees and officials warned people living in the slum to vacate the place in a threatening manner, giving 10 to 12 days of time to the people living here to inform you. Have you remove your slum and empty it? Otherwise the colony will be destroyed by running a bulldozer.
- A demand letter was prepared in the name of the Hon'ble Prime Minister and received in his local office. With this, the demand letter was sent by the Prime Minister's Office, New Delhi by Speed Post, as well as the demand letter was given in the state level public representatives and government departments, whose details are given below

An awareness generation meeting on Covid-19 pandemic was conducted on 9.11.2020 at Konia Jhuggi Basti Near Railway Line Varanasi. Where hand washing methods and mask wearing process and importance of the same were introduced and motivated to start their business for mask making taking it as an opportunity. 50 women, men and children participated in the meeting. They were made aware of vending laws and government scheme regarding vending and social protection. Masks and hand wash soap were also distributed to motivate them and ensure their participation.



Distribution and discussion of IEC (information, education and Communication) material

IEC material were distributed among the vendors and discussed with them regarding vending committees, vending zones, policies and laws on vending to spread awareness and strengthen them by enhancing their knowledge on their rights. Vendors also shared their problems pre-Corona and during Corona. They were also made aware about existing government schemes. When problems written in the IEC material were discussed with the vendors they again agreed that they face those problems in their daily lives.

Case Study

Weaver community got recognition of their work.....

My name is Imtiaz and I am 36 years old. I am a resident of Mominpura, Varanasi. I got married 12 years ago with Sajreen Bibi. I did not read and write because in my family there was a quota to make saree from the beginning and I also got engaged in this work. I have 4 girls, 3 of them go to study and 1 is still young. I started doing weaving work since childhood but I was not aware of any department or schemes related to this work. Just knew that weaver's identity card is made from somewhere but where the documents are made in it, we did not know about it. When we met in our township by Aim Trust, we kept that the government identity card for weavers It would have been better if we had made it too. Then the list of weavers was prepared by the organization and the workers of the organization and about 20 of us went to the handloom and textile industry department in Varanasi and talked about getting the weaver card, besides getting the Aadhar card / identity card / certificate from the local councilor to get it there. Was asked After meeting the local councilor, the institution talked about the residence and work certificate of the people, after which all the documents were submitted to the concerned department. Along with this, I and the local weavers were given 3 days of handloom training under the Prime Minister's skill development, in which the trainer told us new methods and duly got information about the insurance related to the handloom work. Subsequently, through constant advocacy of the institution and all of us community, I and about 30 people of our colony got weaver identity card and weaver's certificate.

Based on discussion with Gopal Sahni, Raju Sahni, Sharda Devi, Shila Devi, Ravi Kumar, Mohan Sahni, resident of Khirkiya Ghat.....

KhirkiyaGhat, slum, situated under the Malaviya bridge, at Rajghat Varanasi, has been associated with various works like construction workers / domestic workers women / sailors / street vendors etc. in the city for almost 40 years. The number of families residing here is 200. The people of this township are not educated, due to which they did not get the benefit of the schemes run by the Central and State Government, along with this, the most serious problem at the local level was water. In 2018, the Samaveshi Sahar project was conducted by Aim Trust and IGSSS under which this township was also identified. Local people, Gopal Sahni, Raju Sahni, Sharda Devi, Shila Devi, Ravi Kumar, Mohan Sahni, kept the water problem in the community meeting of the organization. The workers of the organization said that for

this we will need to come forward and work together, then some of the above people of this colony said that we will all work together for the availability of water. After this, people first demanded in the Prime Minister's Office located in RavindraPuri Varanasi, where the office in-charge Shri Shiv Sharan Pathak ji wrote to the local MLA and Minister of State Shri Neelkanth Tiwari to consider and solve this problem. After that, local MLA and Minister of State Shri Neelkanth Tiwari also held a meeting with the community on the problem of water in the township. The MLA wrote a letter to the local water body and asked him to submit a survey. Water Department J.E. The survey was presented to the Honorable MLA by informing the township survey and correcting the water problem. As a result, a new India Marka hand pump was installed in this slum with an MLA fund for 20 consecutive days and the repair work of the 2 India Markahandpumps in the township was completed by the Water Department. After this, people formed a group and started applying and advocating for their identity and rights, along with awareness programs, as a result, 80% of the people here used Aadhaar Card / Voter Card / PAN at their local address only for their identity. Along with the benefit of card / residence / caste and income certificate, availed under Ujjwala Gas Scheme / Old, Widow, Disabled Pension / Marriage Grant Scheme. The serious problem of this settlement is that where they live, it is land on the banks of the Ganges. And in the name of beautification of the banks of the Ganges by the government, they can be removed at any time for this, the people of the institution and community have also placed their demand in the District Magistrate and RavindraPuri Prime Minister's Office located in Varanasi that we have been here for 40 years and We also have all the certificates of this address, we want that we should be made a residence on this land. But ignoring his demand, the government is repeatedly instructing people to vacate this place.
