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About Organisation

Aim Trust is an association of people working towards the development, empowerment and fulfillment, protection and respect of rights of men, women, transgender and children and to ensure that it reaches the marginalized sections of society including children Dalits, minority, tribal, migrants, transgender and women. Aim believes that poverty can be addressed through integrated and participatory development approaches. From its inception in the year 1999-2000, Aim works for/with marginalized, underprivileged and weaker section of the society. Aim working approaches are development oriented right based, livelihood creation, capacity building, interactive, formation of Community Groups (CGs), strengthening of Community Based Organizations (CBOs), sponsorship of children for ensuring child rights, environment protection etc. Our target groups are children, women farmers, rural youth, elderly people, tribal and communities who are excluded from socio economic development. Aim Trust is a registered nonprofit, nonpolitical, humanitarian, non-sectarian and non-government organization registered under the Indian Government.

Objective

- A. Facilitating health and education services to vulnerable families, creating models of sustainable livelihood options to improve the quality of lives of the marginalized.
- B. Promoting collective action among Women Self Help Groups, CBOs and Producer Organizations by building capacities and technical expertise to effectively address the issues at different level.
- C. Promoting the climate resilient practices and protecting the environmental destruction.
- D. Emergency Response (Covid relief, flood, cold wave and drought relief)

Mission:

To work for holistic development of marginalized, stigmatized and excluded girl, boys, women, men and TGs to address their basic needs and enhance their quality of life.


Approaches

- Facilitating marginalized and excluded groups for access to welfare services.
- Introducing issues specific campaign such as anti-female feticide, violence against women towards long lasting result.
- Awareness building for education, Covid vaccination at different levels.
- Information sharing on welfare of children, person with disability, person living with different stigmas.
- Collaborative approach with diversified groups such as community organizations, academicians, like minded NGOs, corporates etc.

Strategies

Based on the mission, vision statement and comparative advantages, Aim Trust is playing an important role in the promotion of developmental practices. Aim Trust has decided to focus on following areas of intervention as strategy:

- Intensive field level engagement and promotion of community models on child and women friendly local habitat, water, sanitation, food and nutrition, work & environment and livelihood issues.
- Information sharing with government officials on access to services and entitlements.
- Capacity building of children.
- We also engage in baseline on different range of issues such as Child Welfare, Food & Nutrition, and Shelter Rights for homeless, Environment, Water and Sanitation.

Child Welfare



The second wave of COVID-19 hit the rural area hard. Initially, villagers were very reluctant towards Covid testing. In some areas, they even opposed the health officials. The villagers came forth only after people started to die of Covid. Moreover, villagers were overwhelmed with hesitancy to get them admitted to any hospital for Covid treatment. They preferred home isolation.

According to The Tribute news agency - As many as 1,044 children were infected with corona virus in the second wave, said the Health Department. Of them, 562 were boys and 482 girls. The department said only two Covid deaths were reported among children in the second wave. As per the data analysis, the infection among children was only 486 in the first wave last year. In order to prepare for the third wave, which is likely to impact children the most, the department has dedicated a separate Covid ward for children at private and government hospitals. Besides, the

department has asked all pediatricians to get all children tested, if anyone shows Covid-like symptoms.

Amidst second wave the pandemic school again got closed. Online classes were prohibited till the next order. As per the report children also became the victim of this virus. We have had to close our CAC, LC centres both the medium offline and online. This became a big challenging task for us to reach our children as our some of coordinators and field facilitators got infected. Coughing, fever, heart attack created panic among the villages and many lost their lives.

To make our children stay connected with their education we planned to send our volunteers door to door with proper precautions to give assignments to children in their villages. We kept on tracking the government schemes benefits to the community. When necessary our staffs visited the village to make the villagers and children meet the benefits of the free rations (PDS), Kisan Samman Nidhi scheme and awareness. Our team used to do work from home and visited the field when it became very important go. Tele communication helped to stay connected with them. We were able to connect with the children with help of whatsapp, zoom call, conference call and deliver the benefits.


Capacity building of the field staffs

They were firs taught by us and later on they were given assignments to solve and send back to us. Same process the field staffs used with the centre facilitator so do the children. They were motivated to prepare TLM from locally available resource and posters they are interested in. Tasks are been given on alternate days and they are send videos

regarding their queries or taught by Mr. Sanjay Verma, PC.

Due to the second wave of the COVID-19 our centres were temporarily closed to avoid infection







This became a challenge to keep our children touched with education as adolescents were eager to learn and connected. We saw that children were been engaged in home or in the field many children started going to the sugarcane field for getting money as their family don't have other means of earning. This is why parents also got the excuses to engage their children in work. We planned for door to door teaching method. Our centre facilitator goes door to door of the children and give them home work and assignments after teaching. Few centre facilitators used to call children of their villages in 4 or 5 numbers to teach them and give them assignments.





Case Study

The pandemic made Laale work in the field......

Name – Laale

Age- 15 Years

Caste- OBC

Father Name-Jwala Prasad

Mother name- Jai Devi

Village - Revana

Block – Mitauli district Kheri,

Uttar Pradesh

Laale is a 15 years old boy, is a resident of Revana village block MitauliKheri. He has 4 siblings. His father is Mr. Jwala Prasad owns only 2 bigha of land and his mother is home maker. His father used to be ill and when he feels better works as a daily wage



worker. His economic condition is very poor. His elder brother Neeraj got married and lives separate from his family. His elder sister also got married. Now Laale and his two siblings live with their parents. We grow vegetable in two bigha of land. Due to the lockdown last year his education got disturbed as the schools were closed and his family was not able to satiate the need. He had no means of access



to education so after 8th standard he quit his education and started working in the sugarcane field for cleaning, sowing and irrigating @ 200 per day. The situation made Laale do to child labour. Laale said that hunger became more important than education for him as his elder brother separated himself from the family. He has no other means of income. His parents are not literate. His mother also works in other's field as a labourer to run the family.

My name is Ankul Kumar and I live in Kaima village, block Mitauli of Kheri. I am 9 years old and in 4th standard. I study in a government primary school of my village. My mother's name is Mrs. Rita Devi and she is a home maker. My mother has 1 buffalo and 1 baby buffalo she takes care and does all the house hold chores. My father's name is Mr. ShatrohanLal and he works as a labourer on a daily wage. My father studied till 8th standard in the government middle school of my village. My father has two sons the elder one is Ravi Raj 13 years old and the younger one is I. Ravi Raj is a student of 6th class. During the season of sugarcane my father works on local sugarcane crashers and in rest of time he works in the other's sugarcane field. He gets 200 rupees a day when work in sugarcane field and 250 rupees when works at crashers. I have only 10 Biswa (half acre) of land. My father gets 10-12 days work in a month rest of days he stays at home so the income is too low to cater all the needs of my family. My father has to buy everything for kitchen except water. I eat twice in a day. In the morning we eat Sabji and chawal and at night Roti and pulse and only tea as a breakfast. We eat less when don't have enough ration when we don't get work. Last year when I heard about the COVID-19 I had no knowledge about that virus and how to take precautions regarding the same. I thought that this will pass soon. But due to this pandemic all the schools were closed and I got cut from my education. Schools were closed since March 2020 and my family members faced a lot of challenges and also had spent the few nights without having food during the massive lockdown in 2020. Crashers were also closed so we had to face financial crisis and had to take loan from our close relatives. My father use to get work of 10-12 days only in a month. My family condition became more pathetic. So I started helping my father and also started going for work in sugarcane field in nearby villages. I get 80 to 100 rupees a day for sugarcane field hoeing. My elder

brother Ravi also goes to for work and he gets 100 a day for sugarcane hoeing. This is how I started working in the field and in sugarcane crashing season I also go to crashers and get 100 rupees a day. My mother also helps and come to field for work when she gets time she gets 150-200 for a day for hoeing depends on the work done but the story of crasher is different she gets 200 only but my father gets 250 rupees a day. I love studying and playing but my family conditions made me work. I keep books with me and when I get time start studying from own whether it is work place. I have heard about the online class but my father don't have mobile phone so don't know much about it. When I see children wear new clothes I too want to look like same but I don't have money to buy. When I go to my relatives they buy for me that I wear and sometimes my father buy for me. I want to study but when think about my family condition it is faded. My father holds MGNREGA job card and got work in the same during the first wave of the COVID-19 when the lockdown was eased. But in the second wave of Corona Virus he didn't get any work due to Panchayat Election. I was made aware about a learning centre in the villages where most of the children of my village go to learn. I have been regularly approached by Santram bhaiya. My parents and I made aware and motivated to not engage in the work and let me learn and play what other children do. I am going to learning centre but not regularly. I am very happy when be with children at learning centre in my village. Due to family pressure and my economic condition I go in the field with my father for work.



COVID Relief



The past year has been very difficult for people all around the world especially due to the COVIDpandemic which almost paralyzed the globe and now the other strains of Corona Virus has been spreading all over India which has worsened the situation of the people and has created a health crisis and making it very tough for the frontline health workers and doctors to fight against the new strain of the virus. As our governments, medical workers, and scientists struggle to contain and eliminate this viral outbreak, global citizens are doing their part in ensuring safety through awareness, providing food and health related materials. Aim has been actively working with the frontline workers and committed to give its people to the best to get out of this crisis. In the lieu of this Aim with support of CRY-Child Rights & You has distributed health kits to district hospitals of Kheri, U.P. on April 14,2021 and primary health centers (PHCs) Sandilwa, Mitauli, Kheri and Sub Centers of the working area. The health kits include personal hygiene items like spectrum 18 thermometers, 300 gloves, 600 soaps, 15 bottles liquid soaps, 350 bottles hand-







sanitizers,5000 face masks etc. for use by doctors, frontline health workers.


A delegation (Sanjay Rai, Director and Dr.Sanjay Kumar, Prof. YDPG College, Kheri) of Aim also met Mr. Shailendra Kumar Singh, IAS, District Magistrate of Kheri - U.P. on April 22, 2021 and handed over 1500 packs of masks. The delegation also discussed regarding protection of children and reverse migrant workers amidst COVID. The team advocated usage of masks by MNREGA and other workers who have started working in groups. During the meeting a concern was also raised about proper implementation of MNREGA, PDS, ICDS, Direct Benefit Transfer and access to other welfare schemes of State and Central Government.



Aim Trust handed over 2000 packets of masks to Uttar Pradesh Cabinet Minister Shri Ashutosh Tandon (Gopal ji) on May 12,2021 and suggested the departmental order for using the masks by all vendors as their public exposure is very high hence

their safety is very important for battling COVID-19. After that he directed their department to ensure mask to all street vendors and shopkeepers.

COVID and Children



Aim invited Dr. Preeti VermaPandey, Hon. Member, UP State Commission for Protection of Child Rights on March 20,2021 at village Ratahara, Kheri and facilitated to distribute masks.

Aim also handed over demand letter to SCPCR to raise the issue before Kheri based sugar mills such as Bajaj, Birla and Balrampur groups to fulfill the following demands under Corporate Social Responsibility in there working areas.

These demands are –

- 1. Hand washing facilities should be constructed in all schools and hand washing materials like soap, hand wash, etc. must be ensured.
- 2. Free sanitary pads must be given to all the adolescent of upper primary school
- 3. Smartphone will be given to children's parents for online education of children
- 4. Arrange computer facilities in schools and make smart classes
- 5. To maintain social distancing in schools, separate seating arrangements must be made for children.
- 6. During the lockdown and school shutdown, the grains of the midday meal of the children should be distributed in their house.



Aim supported hybrid lauki, petha, kaddu vegetable seeds to 25 women farmers of Bhitara and Musadei Kheri on June 24,2021.

The COVID pandemic has affected the entire world and has proven to be a great setback to the Global economy. All the sections of the society have equally been affected by the prevailing situation and unfortunately the negative one. From the beginning our partner community suffering have been increased day by day. Movement restriction, loss of livelihood and non-access to market worsen the situation. Aim joined hand with Support Group Covid 19 and Zomato Feed India to support communities. Seeing the urgent need we jumped into direct relief.

In context to U.P. India a large-scale reverse migration by daily wage earners has been observed. Most of the workers lost their jobs and compel to stay their respective villages.

In this condition Aim has been providing assistance to the vulnerable sections of our society. Aim has been distributing 100 masks, 35 food kits,150 sanitary kits, 150 preventive equipment and dry ration to the people who are in immediate need. We are also educating them of the preventive measures for COVID and facilitating access to Welfare Schemes of the government and raising their issues before the concerned authorities.

Aima distributed food and masks to 55 women sex workers in Manduadih, Varanasi, U.P. India amidst COVID in August 2021. In the prevailing situation they have nowhere to go and their existence is also not acknowledged. Women sex workers neither have a permanent home nor food and they were also not provided with sanitary kits. Therefore, Aim found assisting them the need of the hour and our representatives went to the places they live and provided them with food, masks and sanitary kits because we believe that all the sections of the society are important.

Aim is also working with the Government machinery. Aim is facilitating the issues of the migrant workers for registration in E-Shram Card of Ministry of Labour, their children and other vulnerable sections of the society to the stakeholders in power. Like this we are assisting the workers in their linkage with the other welfare schemes of the U.P. and Government of India.

Director AimMr.Sanjay Rai also met Shri Arvind Kumar Sharma, MLC and RtdIAS from Prime Minister office onOctober 16, 2021and discussed regarding increasing cases of child marriages, protection of children and reverse migrant workers amidst COVID. During the meeting a concern was also raised about proper implementation of MNREGA, PDS, ICDS, Direct Benefit Transfer, Kisan Samman Nidhi and access

to other welfare schemes of State and Central Government.

Aim Trust is also coming forward and providing assistance to differently abled people of Uttar Pradesh, India. They are one of the most vulnerable people of the society we are supported them 250 food kits and 500 masks.

Mrs. Poonam Kanojia, a washerwoman and her husband Mr. Murli Kanojia, a washer man lives in Lucknow with 3 children. Ever since lockdown started their earnings has drastically reduced and they are planning to go back to their native place Barabank.



Mrs. Anita, a domestic worker lives with her husband Mr. Hansraj and 5 children in Ajay Nagar, Lucknow. After lockdown the people living in houses where she worked are skeptical about her coming and therefore asked her not to come. This has reduced her earning and the family is thinking to go back to Bahraich.

Mrs. RenuYadav who is also a domestic worker and part time tailor lives with her husband Mr. PappuYadav and 5 children



and is in no better condition hence she's thinking to reverse migrate to Hardoi. We also talked to Mrs. Priti who lives with her husband and a child. Her husband Mr. Jitendra is a fruit vendor and the lockdown has affected his sale hence they're planning to reverse migrate too.

Aimhas provided them with 50 packets (20 kgs flour,5 kgs, pulses,2 kgs oil,2 kgs sugar, 200 gram masala) ration for a week and motivated them to stay where they are and do not reverse migrate. Migration will eventually have a negative impact on their children's education and their livelihood once things get back to normal. Aim is trying it's best to support them. We have also linked them with welfare schemes of the Government and raised their issues in front of the concerned Authorities. We have also appealed some individuals and institutional donors to support them.

Along with the migrant workers, their children have also caught our attention. Due to reverse migration these children are going through a lot. This is affecting their health adversely. Going back to villages will also have a negative impact on their education. Aim Trust is providing them with food and masks, facilitating their linkage with the welfare schemes of the government and also educating them about the preventive measures for Corona Virus.

Along with all these activities Aim alsoapprised concerned government departments on different issues of marginalized people and their suffering due to COVID and sent a demand letter on the issues of weavers, regular food and nutrition support to children of vulnerable sections.

During the relief intervention Aim volunteers also observed child abuse and therefore we have also started working with the children which includes educating them and motivating them and their parents for the children's education. We have also motivated our volunteers and other community-based organizations to address the issues of child abuse. We also organize creative writing and painting, book sharing, story reading with children about improvement of learning level and also the preventive measures of COVID.We are facilitating proper implementation of MNREGA, ICDS, MDM, PDS, Direct Benefit Transfer, immunization of Children etc. In our individual door to door visit children made illustrations of Corona Virus with wild native berries. Aim also organized the field visit of Dr. Preeti Verma Pandey Member SCPCR U.P. to meet the children of its working to see the challenges of education in present scenario regarding smart classes, online teaching and its challenges at community level.

Meeting started with the welcoming of the all-SMC members. After that, Ms. Kiran, Headmistress, Primary School, Musadei shared the agenda of the meeting. The agenda were –

- 1. Learning outcome exam of students
- 2. 100% participation of student
- 3. Role and responsibilities of SMC

The detailed discussion was held in the meeting with the SMC and the following final decision came –



- 1. The learning outcome exam of student will be held on 14 Feb 2021
- 2. All SMC member will contact the children and ensure 100% participation in exam
- 3. All SMC member will participate in all meetings of SMC

A new way of learning through online classes in Jan 2022 by CRY Volunteers of New Delhi

Objectives

- To provide a new way of learning to more than 150 children amidst Covid which has brought a major structural change
- To provide make the access to technology for rural children.
- To continue the learning in backward villages
- To provide remedial classes to children





Online classes started in 2 villages of our working area with 110 children with support of CRY, New Delhi.

On first day of online classes, the teachers took introduction of children and also gave their own intro. After that they taught English subject like 2 letter words with the help of pictures.

It was the first experience of children of online classes. Before starting the classes, children has many questions like

- How we will learn in mobile?
- Will we understand the subject?
- What will they use to teach us?
- Will the class interesting?

Distribution of COVID relief materials

Objectives

- To Distribute materials to 80 needy person and children of family
- To aware community about health and hygiene
- To Aware people about hand washing and benefits of hand washing

Sanitary Pads

For distribution of sanitary pads, first of all we prepared a list of all the adolescent girls of our field area and went to the village and verified the name of all the adolescent girls so that no teenager is left out. While making the list, we took special care that none of the economically weaker families, the differently-abled and the needy were left out of this list.



During the distribution, all the adolescent girls were gathered and it was taken care to follow all the social distancing. After this, all the teenagers were discussed and explained about their physical health and their rights were also explained. At the same time, it was also explained that if anyone violates their rights, then complain immediately to the concerned departments without getting scared. Gram Pradhan, Anganwadi, SMC member, Asha etc. were specially invited for distribution and sanitary pads were distributed with their

hands.

Soaps

In the context of Mitauli area, people do not have the habit of washing hands after defectaion and before eating, as a result of which people become more ill as well as fall prey to various skin related diseases which affect their children more.

To bring the children into hand wash practice and to make the parents aware of the benefits of hand wash, talks were made prior to soap dispensation and selected families who were financially weak and had children in their homes so that the children can be protected from disease and corona spreading due to not washing hands.

Surgical Mask and Handwash

PHC (Primary Health Centre), Sandilwa is situated at middle of the Kasta and Piperjhala Road and also our field. Approx. 50 villages people including 15 villages of our field area comes to Sandilwa PHC for their normal treatment. It is very easy to reach there and get proper treatment after registration cost of Rs. 1/- It was found that the PHC Sandilwa is very important for needy people around Kasta and Piperjhala. So we have decided to give our handwash and surgical mask kit to this PHC. We gave 100 Surgical mask and 50 handwash to MOIC of Sandilwa PHC. After getting this, they appreciated our work and said they will help in our work and together will plan some health camps to our area.

Liquid Soap and Mask

As we all know that ICDS Worker, Asha, ANM and Supervisors (staff) are directly connected with the community and every day they constantly go to the field to talk about their problems and their service. All these people are also associated with the people of the community along with adolescent girls and children and get in touch to know their daily updates.

Due to all these things, it is very important for all the above to be healthy as many people are directly benefited by their service, so liquid soap and mask were given to all of the above so that all of them will not only be healthy but also benefit people from their services.

Children Celebrated International Child Day

Objective-

- To celebrate World Children Day to inform children of villages
- To spread awareness among the children and the community regarding the celebrations and rights of children.

250 Children of Bhagwant Nagar, Nimcheni, Kaima, Osari and Samarseypur of our project intervention area celebrated International Child Day on 20th November 2021and develop design from locally available leaves and other materials. Adolescent girls also made posters for this. It was told that International Child Day is observed globally on 20 November every year. The day is celebrated to promote international togetherness, awareness among children worldwide, and improving children's welfare. November 20th is an important date as it is the date in 1959 when the UN General Assembly adopted the Declaration of the Rights of the child.



AIM Trust runs mobile library for unprivileged children Objective

- To increase the interest of the children and keep the connected towards education amidst COVID-19
- Children of underprivileged community also can have access to different types of books in their villages
- To spread awareness and a healthy environment among the villages regarding the importance of education and age-appropriate education



Aim is a U.P. based civil society organisation works on the education of the children of those from deprived community in Mitauli Block of Kheri district of U.P. with the support of CRY-Child Rights and You UK. Aim plays a vital role to get the children out of this crisis and keep the children connected to their education with aim to age-appropriate learning.

Every 15th day of the month, our field coordinators travel among the villages of our intervention area armed with small cartons filled with books carrying on scooty / bike / rickshaw. "Children in the villages eagerly await me. It is heart-warming to see their enthusiasm to read," one of our field coordinators, Ms. Pinki says. Due to the pandemic schools were closed and no mechanism was availed to the government schools i.e. primary, middle and high school. Later on government ordered to provide online classes to the children by government schools but there was no training given to the teachers. Shivani a student of Samarsepur village told that children of this community generally don't have access to smart phone so this practice failed to keep the children connected to the education. She also added that "Now we take books from ma'am and return after reading and ask for new books. The mobile library initiative has helped me to improve of education during this lockdown where schools are closed and we don't have any other means of learning." Children were not able to meet their teachers and they also had psychological pressure that when this all going to end. Adolescents generally are not allowed to go anywhere neither they have access to good books nor are they able to bear the cost of the books. Children receive latest books of poems, stories, creative ideas and NCERT pattern books as well. The mobility library helps us to serve the unprivileged community by reaching to more children or children in need and





sensitize the community for education.

Training on NCERT Pedagogy& Teaching Learning Materials TLM Distribution

Objective

- To give training on pedagogy to build the capacity of the supervisors, teachers.
- To enhance the learning capacity of the children through creative learning and teaching.
- To distribute the TLMs (teaching learning materials) to teachers to effecting learning and teaching.

One day training on pedagogy and distribution of TLMs (teaching learning materials) was conducted at RatahraMitauli under the project 'Children Rights to Quality Education' by AIM CRY- Child Rights and You. The meeting started at



11:00 a.m. on 19th Dec 2021. Mr. Sanjay Verma introduced the training and its purpose and handed over to Mr. Harish Kumar ji so he shared his experience with all the participants and told about the training purpose. He conducted 3 activities regarding the challenges faced by the children. He gave case studies to the participants to solve so everyone replied in their way. He described the methods and

types of pedagogy. Dr. Sanjay Kumar shared his experience of teaching and also

talked about the child centred and child friendly education. Mr. Sanjay Rai told about the usage of locally available resources for TLM making to enhance the participation of the children in education and make it interesting. He also talked about the present challenges and continuous efforts for getting the schools opened. Mr. Sanjay Verma, research coordinator conducted an activity and told how to make



the education not a burden to children but interesting. He told about the communication barriers during the class and after the class with effective solution. At last, TLMs- teaching learning materials were distributed to the teachers by the resource person of their respective villages. The meeting got over at 4:00 p.m.








